

### A Reading from First Samuel

3:1-10

Now the boy Samuel was ministering to the Lord under Eli. The word of the Lord was rare in those days; visions were not widespread. At that time Eli, whose eyesight had begun to grow dim so that he could not see, was lying down in his room; the lamp of God had not yet gone out, and Samuel was lying down in the temple of the Lord, where the ark of God was. Then the Lord called, "Samuel! Samuel!" and he said, "Here I am!" and ran to Eli, and said, "Here I am, for you called me." But he said, "I did not call; lie down again." So he went and lay down. 

The Sermon

The Nicene Creed BCP p. 360

We believe in one God, the Father, the Almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen. #### Scripture Reflection: The "fierce urgency of now"

This weekend we especially remember and celebrate the life and work of Martin Luther King, 1929-1968, an African American Baptist minister and the main leader of the civil rights movement in the United States during the 1950's and 1960's. King had a magnificent speaking ability, which enabled him to effectively express justice. King's eloquent pleas won the support of millions of people and made him internationally famous. He won the 1964 Nobel Peace Prize for leading nonviolent civil rights demonstrations. Martin Luther King heard the voice of God and responded to serve those most in need - those who lived at the fringes of society, those identified in Jesus' Sermon on the Mount, as closest to the kingdom of God. Martin Luther King heard the voice of God and responded in the affirmative, in his words, in the "fierce urgency of now."

In today's Gospel from John, Philip and Nathanael respond to God's voice as heard in Jesus' call and readily follow God's call to service in the world. We pray in the collect for the Second Sunday after Epiphany that we too may readily follow God's call to "shine with the radiance of Christ's glory, that he may be known, worshipped, and obeyed to the ends of the earth." And we hear that wonderful story from the third chapter of the first Book of Samuel where God calls Samuel to follow God.

In the time of a worldwide pandemic, civil unrest and racial injustice in our own land that have caused us to critically examine our own practices, beliefs and prejudices, where and how do you hear the fierce and urgent call of God in your life? What is your next step in working toward justice in our own land and time?

#### Today's Featured Hymn: "Lift Every Voice and Sing"

The African American hymnal of the Episcopal Church, *Lift Every Voice and Sing*, takes its name from our closing hymn, written and composed by brothers, James Weldon John and J. Rosamond Johnson . James studied literature at Atlanta University and went on to become a song writer and anthologist, teacher and lawyer. In 1906 he was appointed to the US consul for Puerto Cabello, Venezuela and later to Corinto, Nicaragua. He worked as the assistant editor of NY Age; was a visiting professor of creative literature at Nashville's Fisk University; was a trustee at Atlanta University; served as a director for the American Fund for Public Service; and for 14 years, was the Na-

tional Secretary of the NAACP.

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"Lift Every Voice and Sing" was publicly performed first as a poem as part of a celebration of Abraham Lincoln's birthday.. In voicing a cry for liberation and affirmation for African-American people.

The song is a prayer of thanksgiving for faithfulness and freedom, with imagery evoking the biblical Exodus from slavery to the

freedom of the "promised land." It is featured in 39 different Christian hymnals.

Composer J Rosamond Johnson set the poem to soaring melodies. It was first performed live by 500 Black American students from the segregated Stanton School (elementary/middle/junior high-level), Jacksonville, Florida, in 1900. Rosamond Johnson was also a singer during the Harlem Renaissance. Born in Jacksonville, Florida, much of his career was centered in New York City.
